The Hope Train

Without a doubt, COVID-19 has brought about unprecedented challenges to both individuals and organisations alike. In the past year, we have seen an increase in requests for financial support by caregivers who have lost their jobs or suffered a reduction of their income. Counselling sessions have also increased by 20%, reflecting the heightened anxiety of families dealing with a child with cancer during an economic crisis.

At CCF, nationwide safe distancing measures to curb the spread of the pandemic has also forced our annual flagship fundraiser, Hair for Hope (HfH), to take a break for the first time in its 18-year history. CCF pivoted our fundraising efforts online with an inaugural social media campaign, The Hope Train, to raise childhood cancer awareness and funds.

Between 23 July and 30 September 2020, more than 3,000 online participants and 11 Friends of The Hope Train hopped on board for four activities – Memoryville, Stillville, Smileville and ARville – to raise more than \$700,000 for children and families affected by cancer! It was moving to see many of you responding to our appeal, and going above and beyond to share your personal stories to spur others to help.

To bring The Hope Train closer to the community, we held our first Facebook live-stream 'Conversations of Change' on 11 August 2020. CCF CEO Ms Peng Hai Ying, CCF Assistant Principal Therapist and Senior Counsellor, Ms Liow Hwee Hsiang, and CCF beneficiary and childhood cancer survivor, Clement



Choo, shared their personal experiences at CCF and how COVID-19 has impacted their daily lives. We also hit the streets in September to collect smiles from the Singaporean community for a video to encourage our beneficiaries.

Memoryville (25 – 26 July 2020)

Make The Change

"I really appreciate CCF and what they had done for us when we needed it most."

CCF caregiver, Mdm Lim, recalls that fateful day on 13 June 2018 when she received news that her then four-year-old son, Jonas, was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia (ALL). "I couldn't believe it. For two weeks, I could not understand whatever the doctors were telling me. Thankfully, CCF had assigned a social worker to us and she constantly provided a listening ear and answers to my questions."

Jonas had been experiencing monthly fevers when Mdm Lim noticed something was amiss. Soon, the fever episodes became even more frequent and Jonas complained of aches in his hips and legs. Eventually, he found it difficult to walk and doctors advised a blood test. "We did not know how to tell Jonas that he had ALL so I told him that he has contracted a virus and needed to be hospitalised to get treatment," shares Mdm Lim.

The diagnosis brought about a series of challenges and adjustments for everyone in the family. Mdm Lim quit her job to care for Jonas full-time while her two elder daughters, aged five and nine years, "practically looked after themselves" as she was in and out of the hospital. With her husband being the sole breadwinner, everyone also had to be more prudent with expenses. "Luckily, CCF stepped in to help us with their financial assistance programme," she adds.

It was caring for Jonas that proved the most difficult challenge of all. Side-effects of the treatments caused Jonas to experience stomach discomfort, vomiting, rashes and pain in his hips and legs. His poor appetite led to frequent neutropenic fevers. He had also grown afraid of injections and was averse to being in the hospital. She found herself leaning towards CCF for the psychosocial support she needed to cope with all the stressors.

"The CCF@KKH playroom was the only motivation for Jonas to fulfil his hospital visits. I personally found the resources at playroom useful too. Jonas was resisting a healthier diet and there was a book on how to encourage your child to eat. I realised that it was more important to get Jonas to eat, rather than what he ate, for his body to have energy to fight against the cancer and withstand the chemotherapy. I eventually gave in to his deep-friend food cravings and he began to eat better."

Mdm Lim was also grateful for the regular Time for a Caring Chat (TCC) sessions with health professionals, caregiver massages and to the CCF social workers and volunteer who took care of Jonas and kept him company. It gave her pockets of time to take a breather from her caregiving duties and made her feel like she was not alone in this journey.

"Before, I never knew that there were so many children stricken with childhood cancer in Singapore. I really appreciate CCF and what they had done for us when we needed it most."



Six-year-old **Jonas** is now in remission and only remembers the best part of his hospital experience – the CCF@KKH playroom where he gets to play video games. We asked what his dreams are, now that he is on the road to recovery and he shares that he wants to be an astronaut when he grows up. "I want to jump all over the moon," shares Jonas shyly.

1. Tell us more about the time when Alveena was first diagnosed with ALL.

Qiara (Q): She was having bouts of persistent high fever for a few months before her diagnosis. When it became more frequent, the doctor referred her to the hospital and that was when they recommended for us to do a bone marrow test. We cried because she was only just about to celebrate her first birthday in a week! We were devastated when the results came back confirming her ALL diagnosis.

2. Is Alveena aware that she has childhood cancer?

Q: Alveena realised it herself when she was about four. She asked me questions like "Mummy, am I sick? Because I'm always going to the hospital." Some of our neighbours' children would also ask Alveena why she has little or no hair and her reply to them would always be a candid "Because I was sick but now I'm waiting for my new hair to grow"!

Haddy (H): I think she gradually realised it as she saw that her life revolved around frequent visits to the hospitals, chemotherapy sessions as well as the relapse.

3. How has Alveena's diagnosis affected your daily lives?

H: I lost my full-time job because I took too much time away from work to care for Alveena and the company could not understand. As Alveena's primary caregiver, I now work part-time as a food delivery rider which has a more flexible schedule. Qiara will go to work in the day and help to care for our daughter when she gets home from work in the evening.

Did you know that the largest age group of children newly-diagnosed with cancer in Singapore is between zero and four years old? CCF caregivers, Haddy and Qiara, didn't. As such, they were dealt with a rude shock when they learnt that their daughter, Alveena, was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia (ALL), a week shy of her first birthday.

Alveena responded well to chemotherapy initially and was en-route to being declared cancer-free. However, she received news of a cancer relapse, this time a week before her fifth birthday. Today, the little one who is now six, is in remission after receiving a bone marrow transplant earlier this year from her daddy whom she regards as her hero.

Haddy and Qiara speaks with *TRIBUTE* to share more about how weekly hospital visits are the norm for them and their hopes for Alveena to finally lead a normal, joyful life.



4. How did CCF help to support your family during these challenging times?

Q: We were initially worried about our financials and the hefty medical bills as a low-income family. Thankfully, our CCF social worker, San San, assured us that there was a financial assistance programme at CCF that we could tap on.

H: We're so grateful for CCF. In fact, our main pillar of support from when Alveena was first diagnosed has been CCF social worker, San San. The emotional support we needed came from her. CCF also kept Alveena very motivated. It came to a point where Alveena enjoyed going to the hospital as she looked forward to visiting the CCF@NUH playroom where CCF staff and volunteers would bring her toys and play with her. Until today, CCF is still helping us with anything that concerns Alveena's health.

5. Alveena underwent a bone marrow transplant in July this year and Haddy was her donor. How did she feel about it?

Q: I was running between wards to care for Alveena and Haddy. She kept asking me questions like "How's my daddy? Did he cry? Is my daddy okay? When is my daddy coming back?" Whenever someone came by the ward, she would exclaim proudly that her daddy is giving her his strong cells! Daddy is like a superhero in her eyes.

6. What is your biggest hope for Alveena?

H: My only hope for her is that she can lead a normal life. I don't have lofty dreams for her, I just want her to be happy.

Q: I hope she will soon get to feel how normal kids her age live their lives.

Tribute also stole a quick moment with little Alveena...

- Tell us about yourself Alveena!
 My name is Alveena Safiyya and I am six years old.
- 2. How did you feel when you had to stay in the hospital?

I feel happy because I love to stay in the hospital and see Nurse Clara. She is my friend.

3. When you stayed at the hospital, what are you scared of and why?

I am scared of injections! They (the doctors and nurses) poke me with a very small needle. It is very painful.

4. Which part hurts the most?

Here (points to joint of arm), and here (points to back of hand)!

5. Have you visited the CCF playroom before?
I always go there whenever I go to the clinic (hospital) to play games and toys. My favourite toy is the dollhouse and the (magnetic) darts. I also like to do puzzles!


Words cannot espresso how much this bean to my family!
